Design for Health

Therapeutic Soft Toy

Collaborative Project 2020-2021

A steralisable therapeutic soft toy for paediatric inpatients which adheres to current infection contol standards.

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The Challenge

Undergoing surgery is a challenging time for very young patients as they are not fully aware of why the surgery is needed, what it entails, and they may not have the presence and support of their family all the time because the rules of a clinical environment do not allow that. Often when children are admitted to hospital, they bring toys that function as objects of support and emotional reassurance. However, in an increasing number of NHS Trusts around England, soft toys are being banned from hospital wards due to infection control reasons. This project aims to design a sterilisable therapeutic soft toy for paediatric hospital wards.

An article in the American Journal of Pediatric Orthopaedics from December 2015, written by J. Schoenecker et al. states how much bacteria is held in stuffed toys, and links soft toys to surgical-site infections. The article recommends soft toys be washed in a home washer-dryer before being brought into hospital, however, this only works on 79% of toys tested and removes around 94% of bacteria in those cases. This does not conform to NHS sterilisation guidlines.

There is currently no soft toy on the market specifically designed to meet NHS Infection Control Standards.

Product Requirments

- The product must help reduce stress in Paediatric Surgical Inpatients
- The product must be able to be high-level disinfected using current NHS Sterilisation Service Procedures.
- The product must be a therapeutic toy that can be a companion throughout the entire patient journey.
- The product must provide a child with a way to relate their fears and anxiety to help reduce their own stress.
- The product must be priced appropriately for the NHS.

Ideation

A co-design workshop was held atEvalina with 7 - 13 year old patients.



Final Idea

1

The final product is comprised of 3 parts.
1. A Soft Toy to provide comfort - given to all paediatric inpatients.
2. A Book to help the child and their family navigate their way through the hospital experience.
3. Injury Stickers and Healing Diary, and Healing Stars – given to the child when they complete healing rituals as a form of positive reinforcement and to allow the child a sense of control over their healing.

At the hospital I get weighed and measured so the doctors and nurses can look after me properly.





Storyboard



Patient and family receive booking letter



Child and family place a sore patch sticker on the toy in the same position as the child's injury/illness



Healing starts get counted daily and written in the book with a daily healing update.



Booking letter explains no home toys are allowed but that the child will get a toy on arrival



Child arrives + gets to pick a toy on admission, toy gets matching ID bracelet to child



Each child gets a book to record their healing journey in



There are different stickers for different injuries. The book is completely editable to suit each child's journey.



Wound size sticker varies as the child begins to heal.



The clinician explains to the child what procedures them may have. They can do this with or withou the toy.



The toy returns to normal lifeschool/playgroup etc to help child return to normal life.



The child + toy can undergo procedures together (anaethesia etc) - providing comfort to the child.



Commemorative healing star placed in toy's pouch to mark the end of hospitsl healing journey.



Child + family get to name their toy and fill in the birth certificate



After the procedure a healing wound sticker can be placed on the toy to indicate beginning their helaing journey together.



Child gets to leace hospital with family, toy and book



Book has images of the toy with blank sections to fill in the child and toy undergo the same hospital journey



A healing star can be placed inside the toy's pouch each time a healing ritual is performed eating, meds, physio etc.
