Learning/teaching strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be achieved, including formative assessments

Core knowledge and understanding of are acquired by means of lectures and other tutor-led activities, seminars, group discussion and guided independent study. The programme progresses from a predominance of compulsory assessment blocks at level I, which provide the building blocks for the work at level II, which depends knowledge of political theory, comparative politics and an ability to evaluate different political systems in compulsory assessment blocks, but allows students to choose options from a very wide range of topics. Level III draws together knowledge and understanding of both empirical and conceptual understanding in the advanced modules in globalisation and the EU. Knowledge and understanding at Level III is also developed by a third of the year being spent on a dissertation on a topic chosen by the student. In 4-year thick sandwich mode, a workshop and tutorials are provided, associated with the work placement.

Cognitive skills are generally developed concurrently with knowledge and understanding. Each assessment block, however taught and assessed, entails the deployment of the full range of the skills identified, although the degree of subtlety, assurance and individuality within which each is demonstrated will inevitably increase as a learner progresses through the programme. Seminars and feedback on coursework (for which there is a standard pro-forma) provide formal mechanisms for students to reflect on their own learning and intellectual development, and make use of constructive feedback. Learning and teaching methods identified above for the 4-year work placement programme of study.

A variety of teaching methods and strategies imparts other skills and attributes. Seminars assist in the development of communication skills. The use of coursework and especially the dissertation assists with skills in the communication of concepts and arguments, the ability to work independently, demonstrating initiative and the ability to organise time and work, and the development of transferable skills in writing, discussion, analysis, and independent judgement.

Summative assessment strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be demonstrated

Knowledge and understanding is tested by means of a range of assessment tasks, including: written examinations; written coursework; and the dissertation. In a 4-year thick sandwich work placement, students will complete a log book of the placement and an extended critical analysis, reflecting on professional development and its connection to their academic programme of study.

The range of assessment methods utilised tests cognitive skills through a shared emphasis on approaching a task or problem via a process of individual research, analysis and interpretation. All require clear, well-evidenced argumentation, and all call upon a degree of creative thought, imagination and independence of mind, although these are most extensively tested through more complex assignments, especially the dissertation, reflecting progression on the programme. Assessment noted above for the 4-year work placement programme of study.

The skills of effective and persuasive written communication identified are fundamental to a degree in International Politics, and are directly assessed in all modules. The ability to work independently, demonstrating initiative and the ability to organise time and work is, similarly, an element essential to successful performance across the programme, and is assessed through evidence of the application of an appropriate range of knowledge and skills to a given task, but is especially tested in the level III dissertation. Transferable skills in writing, discussion, analysis, and independent judgement are a feature of the more independent and autonomous thought and research that characterise work at the higher levels, but opportunities for individual choice are available throughout the programme. There is a requirement that all coursework assignments are word-processed. Skills and understanding of the functioning of the workplace are assessed in the reflective workplace report for students taking the thick sandwich degree.

25. Programme Structure, progression and award requirements

Programme structures and features: levels, assessment blocks, credit and progression and award requirements

- **Compulsory block:** one which all students registered for the award are required to take as part of their programme of study. These will be listed in the left hand column;
- **Optional block:** one which students choose from an 'option range'. These will be listed in the right hand column;
- A **core assessment** is an assessment identified within an assessment block or modular block (either compulsory or optional) which must be passed (at grade D- or better) in order to be eligible to progress and to be eligible for the final award. All core assessments must be specified on the programme specification next to the appropriate assessment or modular block:

Where students are expected to pass the block at D- or better, but not necessarily all elements, then the block itself is core.

e.g. AB3000 Project (40)

Core: Block

Where only some elements of assessments are required to be passed at D- or better, these will be identified by listing each element that is core

e.g. ABXXX1 Title (XX credits)

Core: 1 & 4

Where students are expected to pass all assessments in a block then this will be identified. By setting the assessment this way, students are also required to pass the block by default. This will be identified thus:

e.g. ABXXXX Title (XX credits)

Core: All, Block

- A **non-core assessment** does not have to be passed at grade D- or better, but must be better than a grade F, in order to progress and to be eligible for the final award.
