23. EDUCATIONAL AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

Intellectual property is a fast growing area of the law that requires specialists. This has promoted demand for structured study of the area. The main factors for such a high demand are as follows:

- Fast development of new technologies
- Widespread use of the Internet and other cross border communications and commercial technologies
- A comprehensive and complex legislative framework, at national EU and international level including TRIPS and WIPO.

The Brunel Intellectual Property Law LLM offers a good IP law grounding through its compulsory modules and offers popular options allowing students to build a specialisation area. The programme offers both theoretical and practical elements, which will prove invaluable for would-be practitioners. Students will be able to “sell” their LLM and demonstrate that they can hit the ground running in an IP practice. This is particularly valuable for students who seek an English LLM for its prestige whilst looking to further their careers as well as students interested in advancing their knowledge, understanding and skills in intellectual property law. The Programme also gives an opportunity to improve their employability skills or alternatively to obtain an IPREG qualification for candidates wishing to qualify as Patent or Trade Mark attorneys in the UK.

Learning/teaching strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be achieved, including formative assessments

The classes are normally taught to small groups of students. Tutors use a variety of teaching methods to deliver their modules. Some classes will take the form of a lecture, others will be taught seminar style; others may use a mixture of teaching methods (e.g. lecture, research, case law and problem methods), in order to promote a personalised learning that considers the individual student's interests, needs and abilities. Formative assessments are widely used as part of seminar discussions, dissertation supervision process and specifically designated formative assignments in various modules. There are normally 16 hours of teaching per 15 credit module.

Summative assessment strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be demonstrated.

Summative assessments are designed to efficiently and appropriately assess students' knowledge, understanding and cognitive and other skills developed in each module and to promote a deep approach to learning at Masters level. The mode of assessment for each of the taught modules is either a 3,500-word research assignment or a seen/ unseen exam (and online exams for the IPREG modules), as appropriate to the module learning outcomes and is specified in the relevant module outline. The programme learning outcomes for the taught part are multiply assessed via the summative assessments whilst the Masters dissertation additionally assesses the "Masters Award Only" learning outcomes. All programme learning outcomes must be achieved in order for a student to obtain a LLM award.

Programme structures and features: levels, assessment blocks, credit and progression and award requirements

- **Compulsory block:** one which all students registered for the award are required to take as part of their programme of study. These will be listed in the left hand column;
- **Optional block:** one which students choose from an 'option range'. These will be listed in the right hand column;
- A **core assessment** is an assessment identified within an assessment block or modular block (either compulsory or optional) which must be passed (at grade C- or better) in order to be eligible to progress and to be eligible for the final award. All core assessments must be specified on the programme specification next to the appropriate assessment or modular block:

Where students are expected to pass the block at C- or better, but not necessarily all elements, then the block itself is core.
e.g. AB5500 Project (40)
Core: Block

Where only some elements of assessments are required to be passed at C- or better, these will be identified by listing each element that is core
e.g. ABXXX1 Title (XX credits)
Core: 1 & 4

Where students are expected to pass all assessments in a block then this will be identified. By setting the assessment this way, students are also required to pass the block by default. This will be identified thus: e.g. ABXXXX Title (XX credits)
Core: All, Block

- A **non-core assessment** does not have to be passed at grade C- or better, but must D- or better in order to be eligible for the final award.
