The MA: Creative Writing is designed for students who wish to gain academic accreditation for their creative work, and skills and knowledge in creative writing practice, publishing and pedagogy. It aims to prepare students for:

1. Advancement in creative writing skills across a number of disciplines.
2. Progression to doctorate-level creative writing study.
3. Employment in a wide range of contexts in which writing skills are a central requirement or as a professional working with creative writers.

To this end, the programme is designed to:

1. Provide a framework that demonstrates a broad range of advanced writing techniques and practices.
2. Provide a supportive and constructive environment for students' work.
3. Foster a range of creative and critical skills, including the ability to work independently on a research project.

Learning/teaching strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be achieved, including formative assessments

Learning/teaching methods and strategies:

Core knowledge and understanding are acquired by means of lectures and other tutor-led activities (including workshops and seminars), together with guided independent learning. Expert visiting speakers supplement teaching by school staff. Regular one-to-one tutorials are timetabled throughout the year, including during the project period (during term-time).

Cognitive skills are generally developed concurrently with knowledge and understanding, through the medium of the teaching and learning programme outlined above and expanded on below. As a taught postgraduate programme, particular stress is placed on the development of independent thinking, and on the self-reflective assessment of such thinking. Workshops and regular one-to-one tutorials are designed specifically to foster such development.

Skills are developed through the range of teaching and learning methods deployed on the programme. Individual module sessions make use of at least two teaching methods (lectures and small-group work), with the ongoing programme of workshops and tutorials serving to foster the targeted skills.

Formative assessment is a central feature of the Creative Writing programme through the weekly writing assignments undertaken in all taught modules. The emphasis on providing clear and constructive feedback to students enables them to identify strengths, weaknesses and gaps in their writing, and their theoretical knowledge or understanding. Feedback is provided in a number of ways including through the tutor during classes or one-to-one tutorials, and most notably through self and peer critique opportunities in the writing workshops themselves. These workshops form the bedrock of the programme. The regular writing assignments that feed into these workshops often form the starting points of the texts that will be developed into assessed coursework; and the on-going development of individual pieces of work also contribute to the shared knowledge of the programme's student body.

Summative assessment strategies and methods to enable learning outcomes to be demonstrated.

Knowledge and understanding are tested by means of a range of assessment tasks, including written coursework (often presented in portfolio-form); written project; journal; oral presentation; self-and peer-evaluation of written work; workshop contributions. The wide range of assessment methods is aimed at the full coverage of cognitive skills, both written assessment and oral. Written assignments and oral presentations, the rolling programme of workshops, independent learning, monitored throughout the period via regular tutorials, and advice on the level of IT ability appropriate at Master's level foster the required skills and attributes.

25. Programme Structure, progression and award requirements

- **Compulsory block:** one which all students registered for the award are required to take as part of their programme of study. These will be listed in the left hand column;
- **Optional block:** one which students choose from an 'option range'. These will be listed in the right hand column;
- A **core assessment** is an assessment identified within an assessment block or modular block (either compulsory or optional) which must be passed (at grade C- or better) in order to be eligible to progress and to be eligible for the final award. All core assessments must be specified on the programme specification next to the appropriate assessment or modular block:

- A **non-core assessment** does not have to be passed at grade C- or better, but must D- or better in order to be eligible for the final award.
