#CogSciSci A Meeting of Minds...



We were very pleased to host the above event. The #CogSciSci group began in earnest last year, the initial impetus being provided by Dr Niki Kaiser a science teacher and research schools network lead in East Anglia. Members involved in the group are predominately, but not exclusively science teachers and researchers, interested in the application of cognitive science to the process of learning in classrooms.

51 colleagues attended from far and wide, to listen to presentations and engage in discussions focused on how we can use evidence informed practice to increase the efficacy of teaching & learning in science. To avoid the 'echo-chamber' that can sometimes arise from colleagues with shared interests and values, presentations were presented which challenged the applicability of cognitive science to teaching and learning. Our department's very own Dr David Aldridge warned the audience of the dangers of accepting the outcomes of educational interventions based on cognitive science, without considering David's six steps towards neuro-scepticism.



Pedagogy and Professional Education

The Pedagogy and Professional Education Research Group, led by Professor Gert Biesta, brings together researchers in education with work that involves teaching, teacher education, teacher development, curriculum development and enhancement, and professional education. The research carried out by the group generates both theoretical and practical knowledge which is disseminated to users, policymakers and the wider community through knowledge transfer activities.

Stem Education

The STEM Education research group, led by Professor Mike Watts, is a multidisciplinary group of educators with strong research and development established in the field. The group is a focal point for collaborative work in STEM education, with crossgroup activities and initiatives, and is intended to create synergy and instigate and support individual, small group and wider collaborative projects. Our research and educational enquiry is largely practice -based and aims to inform debates on STEM education and professional learning, and contribute to programmes of excellent teaching in both formal and informal educational settings.

benefits the school by strengthening mentoring skills and adds to staff development opportunities. Student teachers subsequently gain maximum sup-



PGCE PE programme provision for outdoor and adventurous activities.



As you are aware, our students should have opportunity to teach a breadth of potential curriculum activities to adequately prepare them to teach the PE curriculum in any school once they qualify. We do still find that many PE student teachers do not have the opportunity to teach outdoor and adventurous activities and so we put in place each year a project to facilitate this.

We like all our PGCE PE students to teach a unit of OAA to year 7 pupils either as part of the curriculum or as an extra-curricular activity while they are on their DSE/CSE placement experience. This unit of work should ideally be a minimum of 8-12 hours in duration and cover team building and orienteering.

The PGCE PE students select year 7 pupils to take part in an orienteering competition at Hillingdon Outdoor Activities Centre which took place on 19th June 2018. The pupils completed an orienteering course at HOAC in pairs, involving them in:

- Orientating a map
- · Recognising key features on the map;
- Using cardinal points;
- Running between control points shown on the map;
- Using a needle punch at each control point;
- Completing a control card;
- Constructing a word clue associated to each completed control card;
- Do all this within a time limitation;
- Score points for correctly completed control cards, for completing each map in time or under time and for completing their word clue correctly.

The PGCE PE students were responsible for doing all the organisation at school in preparation for this competition, which helps them also evidence broader Teachers' Standards.

This requires them to:

- Select the pupils to represent the school at the competition from the group who have completed the unit of work on the basis of agreed criteria with you. (We do encourage them to involve pupils who might not always necessarily represent the school at sporting events);
- Prepare the information letter and consent form for pupils and parents;
- Monitor and record the return of consent forms;
- Complete a school risk assessment;
- Organise the staffing and transport for the pupils for the day;
- Ensure pupils have the correct kits, a packed lunch and fluids for the day;
- Organise for the University official photographer to come and take pictures and secure permission for these photos from the pupils parents;
- Take responsibility with accompanying school staff for safeguarding on the day and ensure they have all required pupil contact details, medical information etc.;
- Brief and prepare the pupils for the day and on the day itself;
- Design and prepare the certificates of participation for all pupils and then choose and order through me the winning trophies for the best pair and the overall winning school.

I hope from this outline, you can see that this is a positive project for both pupils and PGCE PE students to take part in.

Part-Time Doctor of Education (EdD)

Department of Education – next cohort begins January 2019

Our Doctor of Education (EdD) postgraduate research degree is currently recruiting for the January 2019 cohort. The EdD is offered on an exclusively part-time basis with one intake each January. Students are supported through to successful completion of their doctorate drawing on extensive expertise from within the Department of Education and our University Graduate School. Within the Department we have two research groups: STEM Education and Pedagogy and Professional Education (PPE) and an overarching theme of social justice, inclusion and equity that underpins much of the research interests of staff within these groups. EdD students are supported by staff from within these groups (e.g. Professor Gert Biesta, Professor Mike Watts and Dr Paula Nadine Zwozdiak-Myers) and have the opportunity to become valued members of the research community in the Department through their doctoral study programme. In November 2015 our provision for PGCE Primary and Secondary Initial Teacher Education secured a double outstanding grade from Ofsted. We are also fortunate to be part of a successful bid to the ESRC to become a doctoral training centre for Education in collaboration with Oxford University.

Our EdD is targeted at senior professionals with a responsibility for education within their organisation. They may be schoolteachers or college/university lecturers but they may also be working in professions allied to medicine and social care, nursing or other public sector occupations such as the police and fire service. Run on a cohort model, we are offering 10-12 students places on this exciting EdD programme each year. The programme has been designed to enable these senior professionals to engage in work-related research that makes a real difference to their organisation as well as to them personally. Teaching and supervision on the programme takes place during weekend (e.g. Friday afternoon/Saturday) and summer school blocks to fit around the demands of our students' jobs.

The EdD is a core part of the Department's strategic plan to offer a continuum of professional education for teachers and others, from initial preparation through to doctoral programmes. Many teachers and other professionals now have Master's degrees and are considering the next step in their personal and professional development. The Brunel EdD offers a high quality doctoral training and supervision experience for a small cohort of experienced professionals who see doctoral study as a way of making a real difference to the profession as well as themselves personally.


