

Tashkent State University of Law and Brunel University of London: Strategic Partnership and the Development of Legal Education in the Spirit of the Great Silk Road

During the IV International Legal Forum “*Tashkent Law Spring*”, Tashkent State University of Law and Brunel University of London signed a memorandum of understanding in May 2025. The signing ceremony took place within the framework of high-level discussions dedicated to strengthening academic diplomacy and expanding international cooperation in legal education. The memorandum reflects the mutual interest of both institutions in developing joint academic initiatives, promoting comparative legal research, and supporting student and faculty mobility.

The agreement outlines plans to develop joint educational programmes, organise expert workshops and guest lectures, and facilitate collaborative research projects in priority areas such as international law, digital technologies, and contemporary legal practice. Both sides emphasised that the partnership aims to enhance the global competitiveness of legal education and contribute to the preparation of highly qualified specialists capable of addressing modern legal challenges.

The signing of the memorandum marks an important step toward deepening cooperation between Tashkent State University of Law and Brunel University of London. It is expected that the new partnership will create long-term opportunities for innovative academic development, strengthen institutional ties, and expand TSUL’s engagement with leading universities in the United Kingdom.

As part of its deepening cooperation, Brunel University of London has decided to donate more than 100 books on various areas of law to TSUL. This step is seen as a strategic investment in the development of legal education in Uzbekistan and as a continuation of a thousand-year-old tradition of cultural and scientific exchange, which once made the cities of Central Asia—Samarkand, Bukhara, and Tashkent—the largest intellectual centers of their time.

Expanding international cooperation in the field of higher legal education is one of the priority strategies of Tashkent State University of Law. In this context, partnerships with leading global universities contribute to improving the quality of legal training, developing scientific research, and integrating Uzbekistan into the global educational space. One of the significant results of the new stage of cooperation between TSUL and Brunel University of London (UK) was the decision of the British partner to donate more than 100 books on key areas of legal science to the university. This step is not just an act of academic support but also a strategic investment in the development of legal education in Uzbekistan.

The collection includes fundamental and contemporary scientific works by leading British scholars and practitioners. The books cover a wide range of legal disciplines and areas, providing access to the latest international expert thinking.

The collection includes key monographs on issues such as sources of international law, state responsibility, mechanisms for peaceful dispute resolution, international security, and the activities of international organizations. These books will enable students to gain a deeper understanding of contemporary trends in the development of the international legal order, including UN reform, cyber law, and issues of global governance.

An essential element in the successful implementation of Brunel University's initiative to donate more than 100 books was the active involvement of the Embassy of the Republic of Uzbekistan in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. The Embassy served as a vital link between the two universities, providing diplomatic support for the project and resolving a wide range of organizational and logistical issues related to the transportation of these valuable academic resources to Uzbekistan.

Thanks to the assistance of the Embassy of Uzbekistan in the UK, the following were ensured:

- Effective coordination between the parties, including legal and organizational aspects of the transfer;
- Support in preparing and processing the accompanying documentation required for the shipment of materials;
- Logistical facilitation, which enabled the timely and secure delivery of the books to Tashkent;
- Communication support aimed at strengthening academic ties within the broader framework of bilateral relations between Uzbekistan and the United Kingdom.

The participation of the diplomatic mission played a crucial role in ensuring that the initiative was carried out successfully and gained further momentum. The Embassy emphasised the importance of academic exchanges, noting that education, science, and culture form the foundation of stable and long-term international relations.

Thus, the contribution of the Embassy of Uzbekistan in London added not only organizational but also diplomatic significance to the project, reflecting the state's strategic commitment to the internationalization of higher education. This demonstrates that advancing legal scholarship and expanding cooperation with leading global universities remain priorities in Uzbekistan's international agenda.

The donated books will significantly expand the university's academic library collection, allowing modern international and European academic materials to be incorporated into the educational process. This creates an environment that meets the highest global standards of legal education. The books will also serve as a basis for dissertations, scientific articles, conference reports, and comparative legal studies. This is particularly important for the integration of Uzbek legal science into the global scientific community.

The transfer of more than 100 books from Brunel University is an important step in strengthening the partnership with Tashkent State University of Law. This contribution significantly expands opportunities for learning, scientific development, and academic mobility.

British authors provide an in-depth analysis of EU institutions, the case law of the Court of Justice of the European Union, internal market regulation, human rights protection, digital regulation, and European competition law.

The initiative by Brunel University to donate over 100 books to Tashkent State University of Law represents a significant strategic step in the development of international academic collaboration and the modernization of legal education in Uzbekistan. The collection covers key areas of legal scholarship — including public and private international law, international humanitarian law, European Union law, human rights, commercial law, and legal philosophy — providing students and researchers with access to contemporary British textbooks, monographs, and high-level analytical materials.

This initiative not only enriches the TSUL library's holdings but also creates opportunities for joint educational programs, academic exchanges, and collaborative research projects, enhancing the professional competencies of future legal specialists and supporting the integration of Uzbek legal scholarship into the global academic arena. Moreover, the partnership carries historical and cultural significance, continuing the traditions of the Great Silk Road — a pathway of knowledge, ideas, and cultural exchange between East and West. Thus, the project represents not only a concrete contribution to the development of TSUL's educational and research infrastructure but also an element of sustainable scientific and cultural collaboration, strengthening Uzbekistan's position within the international educational and legal community.
